

Workshop Descriptions

A Biblical and Psychological understanding of God's Calling

God's calling is what gives meaning to ministry and life. This workshop will examine the Biblical understanding of God's call, the importance of context of the call, and the effect of church and culture on understanding the call.

Will draw on Faith Development Theory of James Fowler, Victor Turners' work on liminality from Arnold van Gennep's Rites of Passage, as well as selected chapters of my book The Q.U.E.S.T for Vocation: A Personal Journey to Discern a Life's Calling. (2013, Xulon Press).

Developing Students for a Changing World: Student Development is Leadership Development

Centenary College re-conceptualized Student Life and Career programming into a more holistic, developmental, and co-curricular environment designed to guide students through living, learning, and action. Learn about the integration of developmental theory in a co-curricular student development experience called Centenary Leadership.

Answering the Call: Heroes and the Integration of Vocation

Will discuss the process of using superhero stories (and other stories from literature) providing a framework to aid students in vocational discernment. Will use concepts from Joseph Campbell's Hero's Journey and the heroes and heroines from the Marvel Comic Universe.

Storytelling, Discernment, and Discovery: The Art of Reframing Students' Initial Questions about Profession

The common question for many college students is, "What am I going to do with my life?" Learn about how Centenary, believeing this is a question to be asked over a lifetime, uses storytelling as a main practice of Professional Discernment in such programs as Discernment Coaching, Discernment 101 and 201, Deposit Student Engagement Coaching, and the High School Leadership Academy.
