Do You Have Memories of **Grace Methodist Church?**

Grace United Methodist Church in Winfield is being nominated to a place on the National Register of Historic Places, a process that includes collecting artifacts concerning the church.

The church's roots began to grow in 1886 when a group of Southwestern College students, tired of walking two miles each way on muddy, unpaved streets to attend church downtown, organized their own Sunday School class in the home of a faculty member who lived close to the college. By 1888 it had attracted not only students and faculty, but local residents of the College Hill area as well.

That year the annual conference recognized the "student church" as Grace Methodist Episcopal Church. For the 116 years that followed, the story of Grace Church has remained closely tied to the story of Southwestern College.
