Preface


With grateful appreciation of the hearty cooperation and unfailing support of the faculty and student body of our college the staff presents the 1925 Moundbuilder.





The Irish embellishment consisted characteristically of spirals, interlacements, and strange inter-woven conventional animals and birds of Ireland, done by the artist monks.




BASKETBALL

Interest in forensic contests among the students has been growing steadily stronger, and it is hoped that in a few years as many students will attend these contests as gather to see a basketball or football game.



Violin Quartette




The Violin Quartette has made many trips this year to nearby towns and from all reports have been received with great enthusiasm. They have played in chapel on special occasions and have been loyally received.


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


The society has worked and is working for the school, and the members have banded themselves together in order to uphold Southwestern traditions.










Athens



May it ever be said of Delphi: "Her loyalty to her school has no death; her devotion to mankind, no end."







This is what the Young Women's Christian Association means to Southwestern College, and it stands as a strong foothold for any girl to cling to.








Life-Service Grovp



Le Circle Francais







Each local chapter decides upon its own activities. The constitution of the Southwestern Chapter provides for an informal affair in the fall, a formal banquet in the spring, a play dealing with some social problems, and one lecture by an outside speaker.

The fundamental purpose of Pi Gamma Mu, that of encouraging and rewarding the undergraduate study of social science, will help train our college students so that they will be more capable of influencing public opinion and legislation along social lines.




ALL STARS

Story of S. C. in Medival Age


It is not definitely known for what reason Richardson Castle was established. Many cling to the theory that it was built by Richard the Lionhearted as a successful culmination of an anti-dancing crusade.
