

























#### IN DEDICATION

Under the able leadership of Dr. Jack W. Juergens, the Purple Robed Choir went modern this year and rehearsed, for the most part, numbers written by contemporary composers. Included in their repertoire, however, were some numbers from the classical era and at the annual Christmas concert, they turned to the Baroque era for a setting of the Christmas story that was written nearly 300 years ago.

The first performance for the choir was at the annual Central Kansas Conference at Salina in October. An eight-day tour was scheduled in April and 21 towns lined the schedule for the songsters. They appeared at Hutchinson, Canton, McPherson, Lyons, Chase, Stafford, Ellinwood, Kinsley, Montezuma, Garden City, Deerfield, Liberal, Pratt, Wellington, Mulvane, and Derby.

Represented among the choir members are 30 Kansas communities in addition to students from five states other than Kansas and one student from Santiago, Chile.

The 24th rendition of *Elijah*, an oratorio by Felix Mendelssohn, is the annual production of the Winfield Oratorio Society. Mr. Ross O.•Williams, conductor of the work for the 12th time in Winfield, rehearsed the 250—voice choir twice weekly and the 45—piece orchestra three times each week. The orchestra is composed of members of the Southwestern Little Symphony and several community musicians. All junior and seniar bays were elgible for the singular honor. They were judged by their grooming, personality, participation in activities and their interest in the promotion of home economics on the campus.



## DEBATE

This year members of Southwestern forensic squad participated in twenty tournaments. Meeting squads from 95 colleges from coast to coast, the debators added plaques, trophies, and certificates to their large collection. All in all they traveled nearly 10,000 miles.

Throughout the year enthusiastic speakers gave their best in supporting traditions of Southwestern's debate squads and created a reputation for themselves throughout the country.

During the year Southwestern hosted the largest debate tournament ever held on the campus. This was the 28th annual college invitational tourney at which 151 teams participated and 51 schools, 14 states, and four state universities were represented. 
