The second semester featured three additional presentations of extremely high caliber. The College Musicum, a University of Illinois énsemble, utilized an array of antiquated musical instruments and a repertoire of ancient music. Perhaps the most noteworthy name on the roster of personalities was that of Vance Packard, author of *The Status Seekers* and *The Hidden Persuaders*. He presented a vital commentary on the "Changing Character of the American People."

The Artist and Lecture Series culminated in an elucidation of "The Revolution of Western Thought" by Dr. Huston Smith, the first professor of philosophy to be appointed to the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.




Blaine Babb looks on as a Sterling player caps a rebound.
