SCIENCE CENTER & MABEE LABORATORY COMPLEX



*T*he Beech Science Center and Mabee Laboratory Complex was officially opened for classes on January 16, 1998. A convocation ceremony was held for students, faculty, staff, alumni, and friends of Southwestern. 779 contributors provided the 4.2 million that went into the construction of the 35,600 square foot complex. The center is named for Mrs. Olive Ann Beech and Mr. and Mrs. John Mabee, whose funds were essential to the project. Keys to the complex were presented to Mr. Steve McSpadden on behalf of the Board of Trustees, Dr. Stephen White on behalf of the alumni and Science Advisory Councils, Mr. Max Thompson on behalf of the faculty, and Ms. Karissa Wright on behalf of the students. To conclude the ceremonies, the cutting of four ribbons draped across the science complex commenced.

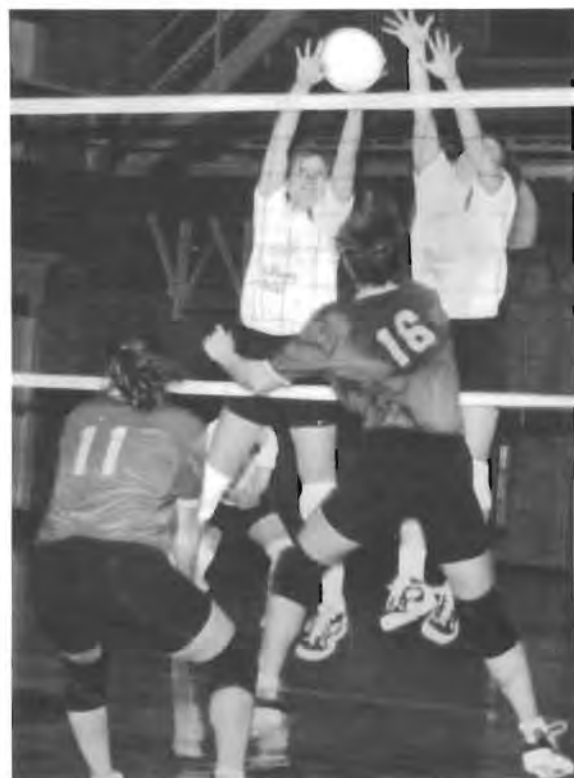

Men's Basketball To The Top

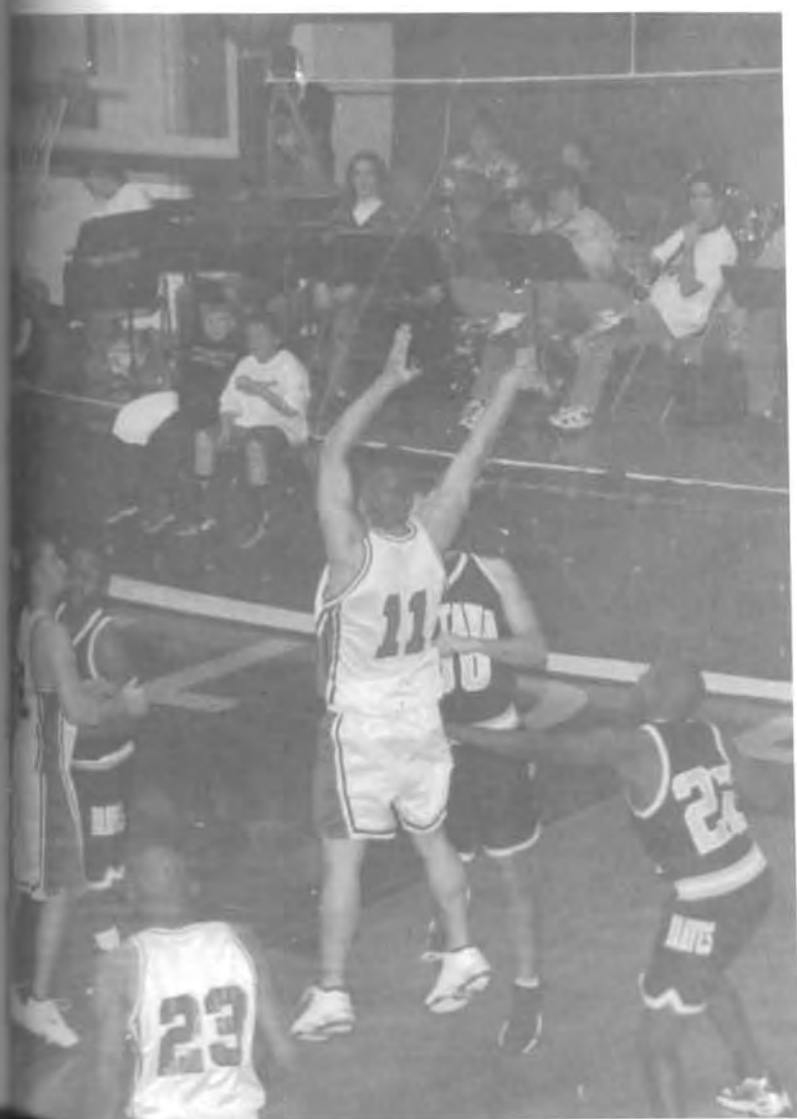

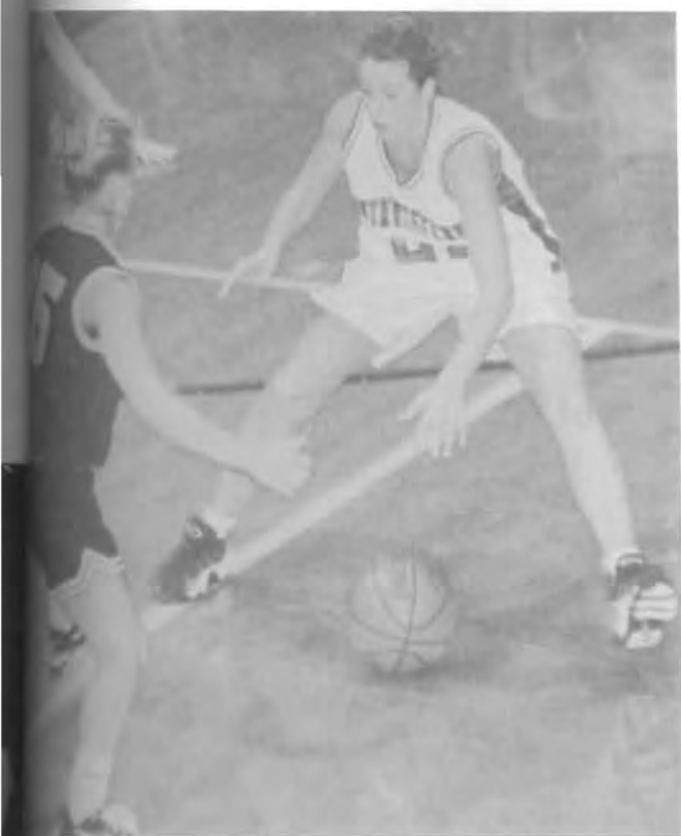
In Pursuit of Victory

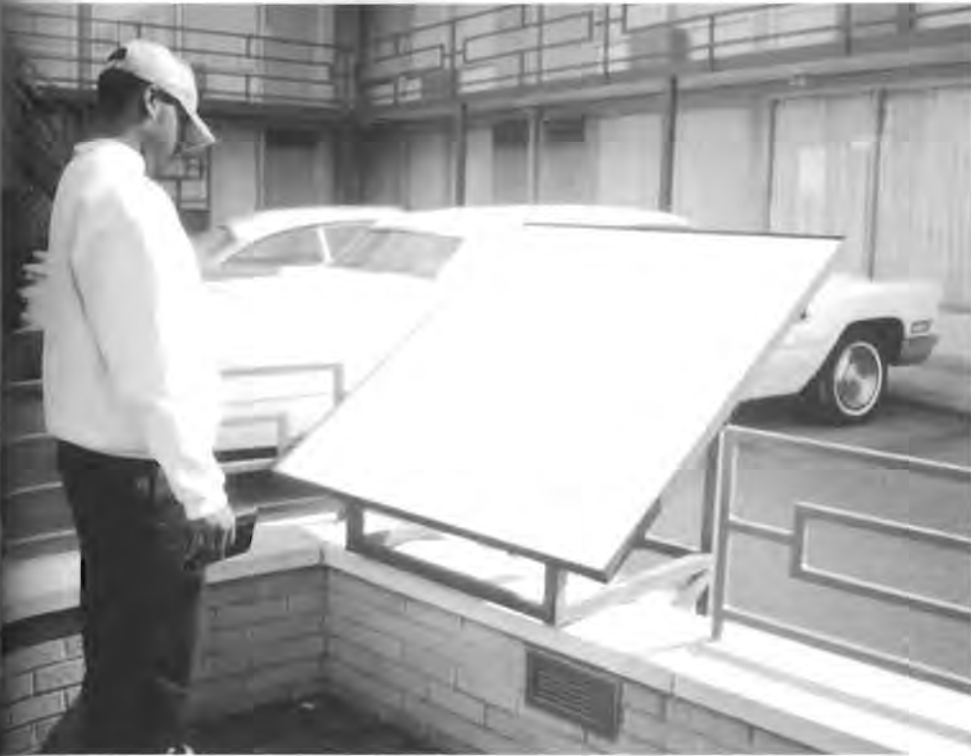
