# The Community That Is... 

## Southwestern College

Three weeks into the Southwestern College's 117th year, our lives were changed forever We at Southwestern College set off to our classes, confident we were on our way to th brighter future a college education brings. What we didn't know was that very morning 19 men were boarding four major airline planes with ill will in their hearts. On Septembe 11 th, 2001 at 8:48 EST our world stopped to watch the events unfold. The unthinkabl had happened. International terrorists attacked on American soil.
George W. Bush waited two days to make a solid statement of intent. The War or Terrorism had begun. The campus community responded with shock, then acceptan $a$ and finally we began to think about the issues as they related to our own beliefs. We mads the issues our own and incorporated them into our nation's renewed sense of patriotism As traumatic as the events of September 11th were, the world continued to turn and lif went on. Our own proud traditions left unscathed by the hand of international terrorism we began a new year just as students have for over a century at SC. Looking over the Walnu Valley, the heart of Southwestern College continued to beat within the walls of the Christ Administration building.
In March 1956 the building which now stands high atop the 77 was named after R.B Christy, a resident of Scott City and a prominent member of society. His donation helpee rebuild the structure after a fire destroyed the original building, Richardson Hall.
Richardson Hall stood from 1908-1950. James H. Richardson not only donated the money needed for the building's construction, but had a keen interest in the curriculur taught at the college. A man of science, Richardson had hoped that Craniology (the stud of the head) would be added to the course list. Thus, a strong scientific foundatiot flourished alongside the college's rooted Christian faith.

In 2002, the Christy Administration building continues to function as the center Southwestern College. In addition to housing the office of President Dick Merriman, th structure contains College Services. Also on the second floor of Christy, Richardso Auditorium. After years of discussion, the first steps of renovating the auditorium bega in December. In hopes of preventing another catastrophic fire, the school installed sprinkler system above the stage and throughout the Helen Graham Little Theatre, locato in the basement. Plans for a complete renovation are still being discussed.

In addition to housing vital administrative offices and community spaces, Christy alu holds entire departments within its limestone exterior. The first floor of the buildin contains the faculty offices and classrooms for those associated with the Communication Arts, History, Mass Communications, Psychology and Theatre Departments. Studer publications such as The Collegian and The Moundbuilder are produced in the basemen of Christy. Students of Debate and Forensics congregate the hall with performen costumers and technicians from the Theatre Department. Together, these student represent part of the Liberal Arts background that once drove Southwestern College.
From the third floor office and classroom windows of Christy, the Walnut Valley can be seen from one of the highest points in the city of Winfield. Home to the Business Department, faculty and students discuss the challenges our world faces after the September 11th attacks.

As the world reacted to the horrific attacks of September 11th, people found sanityt holding on to time honored traditions. From saying the "Pledge of Allegiance" watching the World Series, Americans united. The personal freedoms that had ber taken for granted were reevaluated as terrorism sought to destroy what is the Uniter States.
Southwestern College is built on tradition, it even lends to our namesake. Every yea during the first week of classes, students gather around The Mound and add to the "mound of loyalty" that was established in 1927. As individuals and organization those associated with the college unite as Moundbuilders. The 2001 Moundbuildin Ceremony was no different. Students, faculty, alumni and members of the administratic gathered at the base of the 77 to watch the Mound grow.
Dean Leroy Allen established this unique tradition on September 8th, 1927. Alle challenged the college community to build a mound of spirit that would grow into mountain for all to see. He added to the first contributions, a metal lock-box tin capsule. When the Mound was moved in 1963, south of Mossman Hall, the time capsul was found rusted through and the original contents were destroyed. A new time capsul has been added and contains items that represent campus life in 1963, as well as alii of original contents placed in the first buried within the Mound.

Another time capsule was buried beside the Mound on August 24th, 2000. Tir Millenium Time Capsule is marked with a limestone rock and will be opened in on hundred years. Contents of that capsule include items that are much more familiar those attending SC today.

The first Moundbuilders of SC threw pebbles into the Mound, but today paintof boulders are added. From The Moundbuilder staff to the football team, the Moun only gets bigger and brighter with time.
Freshman Workday has become a Southwestern College tradition since the mid 1990's. Incoming students spend their first day on campus within the Winfiel community, trying to make a difference. The class is divided into groups and sprear throughout the town, completing tasks for those in need. For some, it means scaling : ladder to paint a house and for others, it involves yard work. Whatever the job maybe students become acquainted with each other and the community. This tradition, thoug fairly new, allows students to become leaders through service from their very first day on campus.
The community of Southwestern College, as did the rest of the country, came together in a time for prayer after the September 11th attacks. Drawing upon the college' Methodist tradition, students met in Wroten Hall for an evening Prayer Vigil that same day. Alongside college staff, those who attended voiced their thoughts about ${ }^{2}$ uncertain future for the United States.
Traditions, old and new, have been honored at Southwestern College for years. Whil they may seem strange or unusual, like building a mountain in Kansas, they allow ust hold onto the past. The connection to what was Southwestern College feeds into the ide of what shall be in the time to come and perhaps we're better Builders because of it

Although the Southwestern College community gained strength through the pride found in the foundation and traditions of the school, students truly found themselves in their studies. While future teachers attended classes in Center for Teaching Excellence, future biologists and scientists were working within the Beech Science Center. Students in the Liberal Arts department were a part of their own traditions associated with the Darbeth Fine Arts Center.
In the tradition of the Methodist circuitriders, Southwestern College is first and foremost an educational institution. The bond between students and faculty has been and continues to foster a level of learning that keeps dedicated students coming back for more.
The 2001-2002 school year brought with it a message of the future. The freshman women's dorm opened for new arrivals. At the time of this publication, the building had yet to be named, but was dubbed WORM. WORM was an acronym formed from the first letter in each of the RA's names: Tara Williams, Megan Otto, Lisa Reynolds and Claire Myers.
With the completion of one building, the college continued to build. A sprinkler system was installed in Richardson Auditorium and in the Helen GrahamLittle Theatre over the Decemberholiday. Mossman Hall, the former science building, underwent a $\$ 1.7$ million renovation in time for the start of the 2002 school year. The building will house the Business, Psychology and History Departments on the ground level. The second floor will continue to hold the Nursing Department.
The Professional Studies Program of Southwestern College continued to flourish from three off-campus locations. From offices in Winfield and Wichita adult learners withat least 48 credit hours could enroll in a degree completion program through SC. The program took to the web and MBA and Pastoral Studies courses were offered via the internet.
As the college continues to evolve through the $21^{\text {st }}$ Century, a firm grasp on the past reminds us of our roots and directs our future. Whether we were actors settling into a role or athletes chasing our Personal Record, Southwestern College became "home" during this past year. It offered the comforts of a new dorm and the challenges of a higher education. Our relationships with professors opened new doors and the struggles with the administration strengthened our resolve. As a whole, we progressed through the year in our fields of study, while; running track, playing soccer, working on the side, raising children, presenting plays, debating issues and chasing deadlines to put it all in print.
