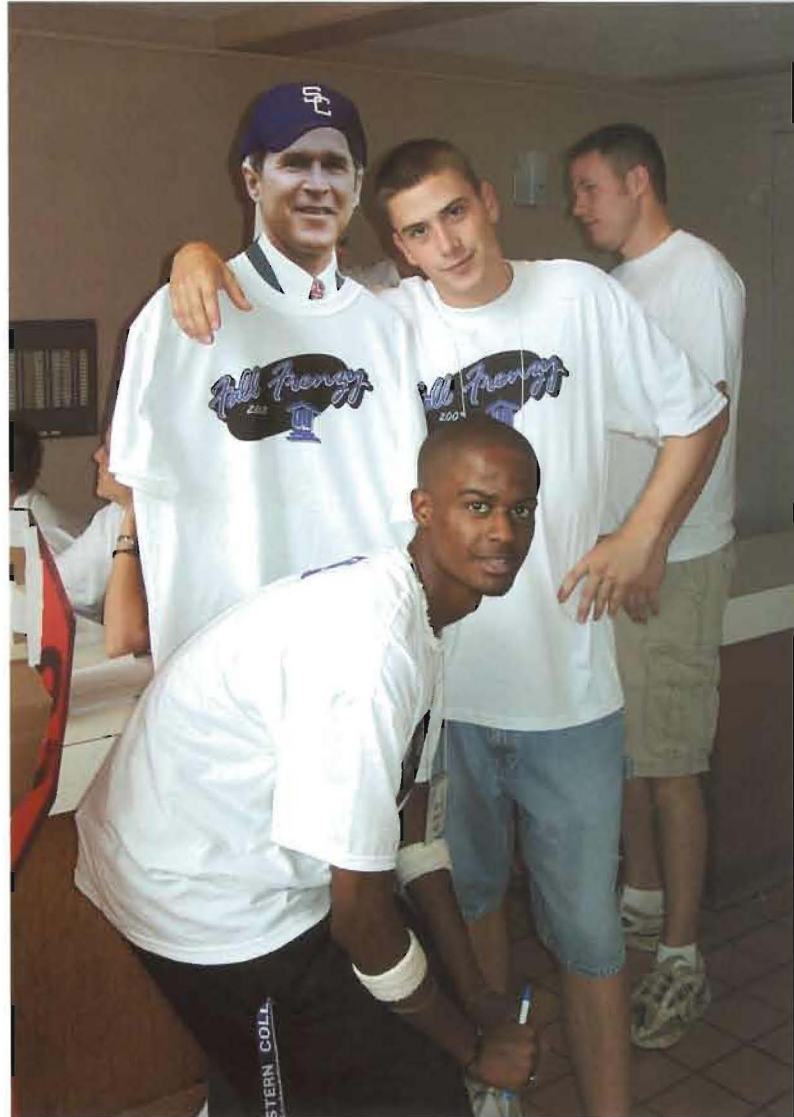

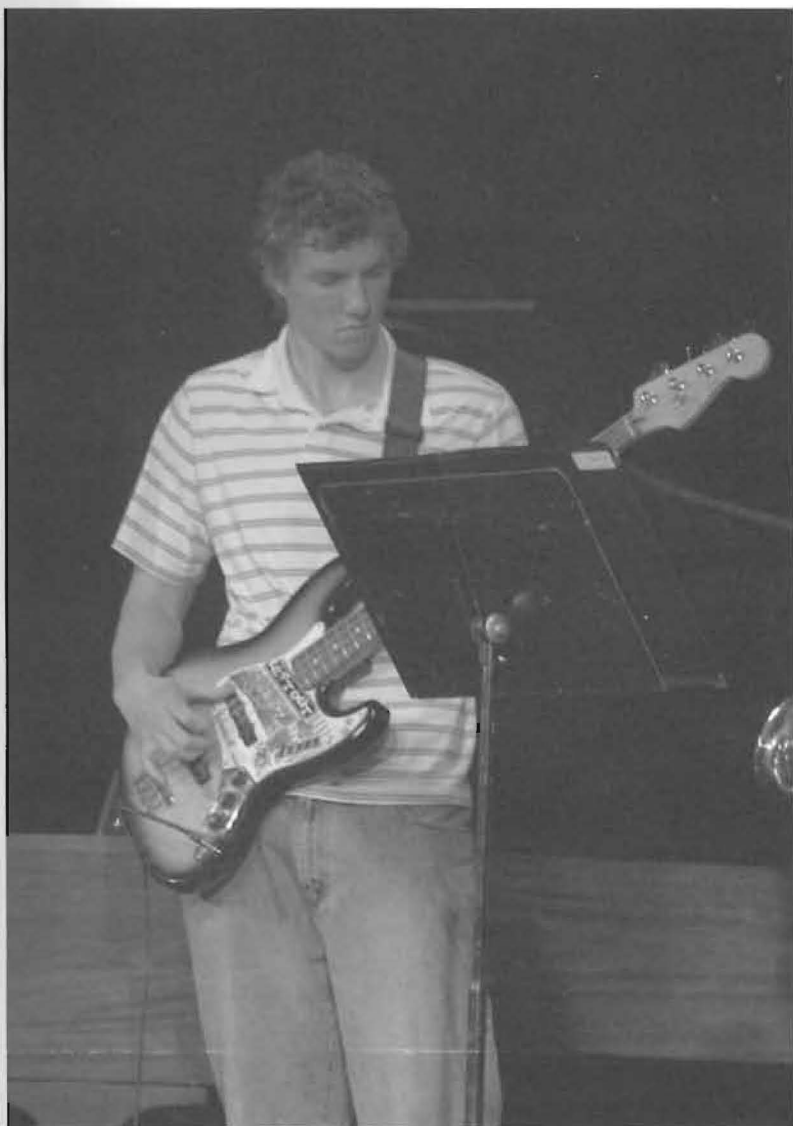

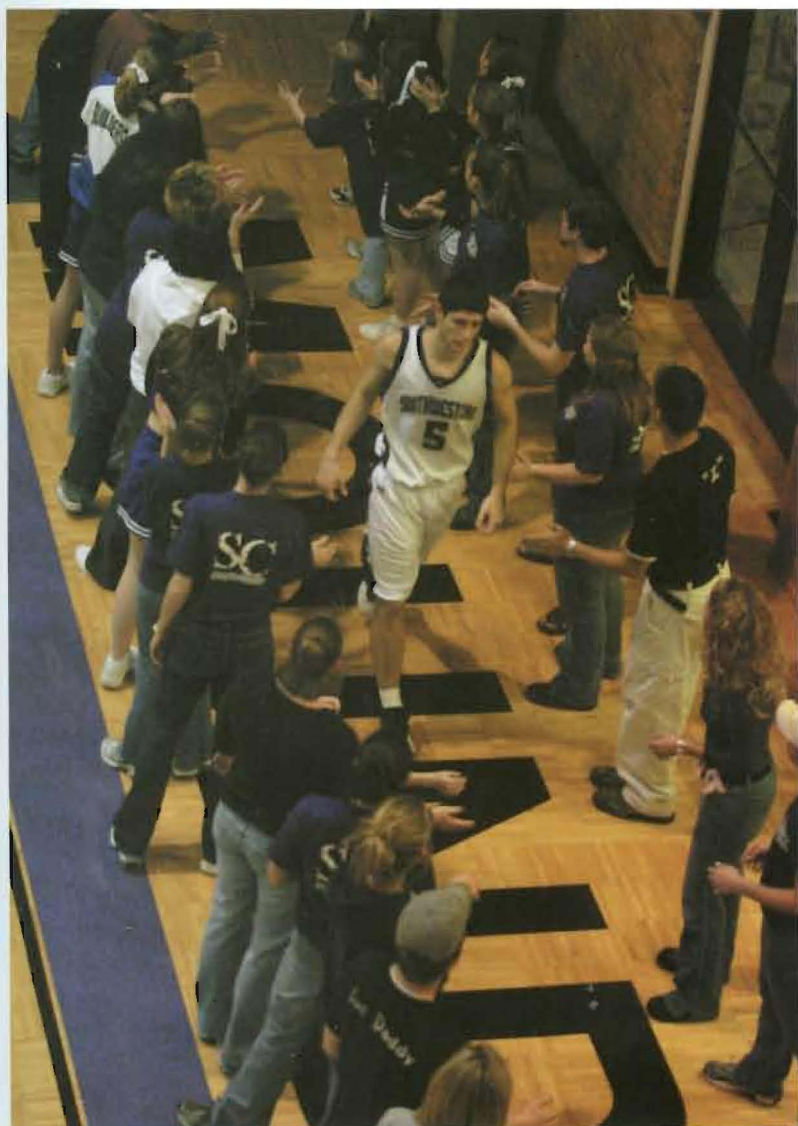

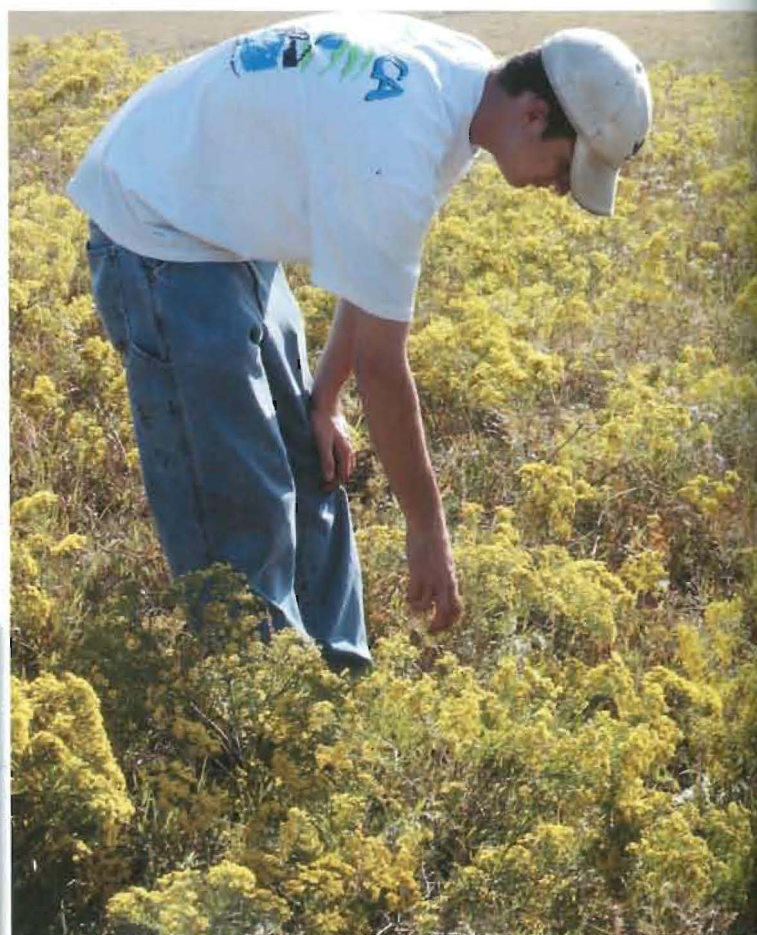

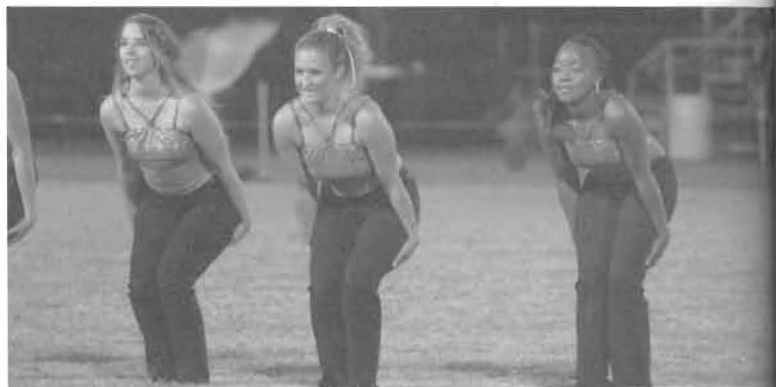

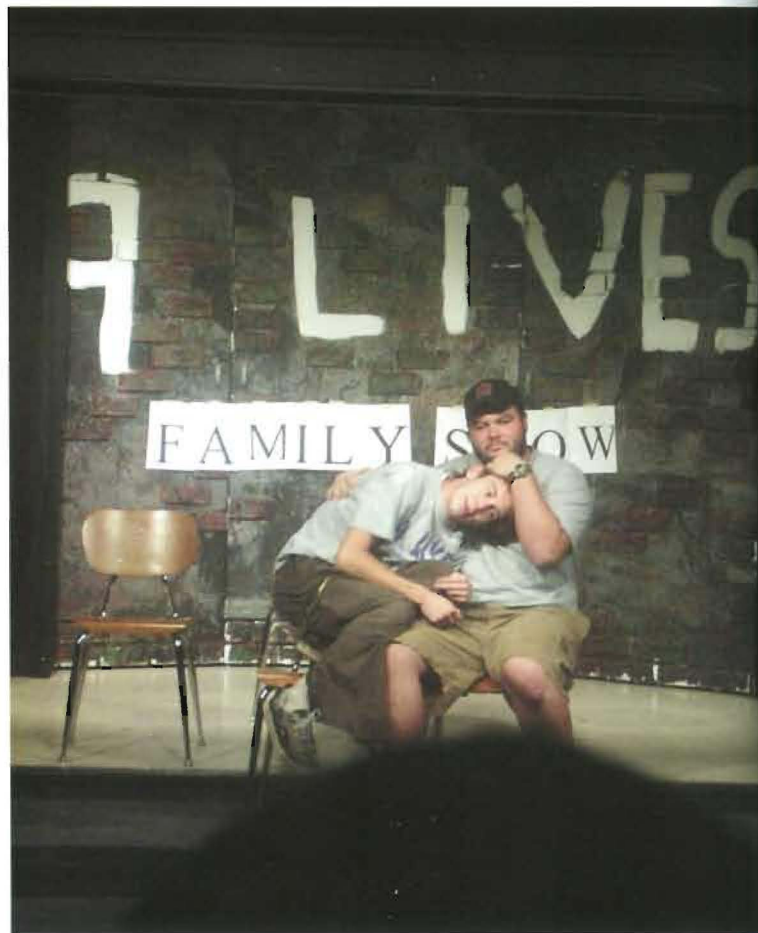

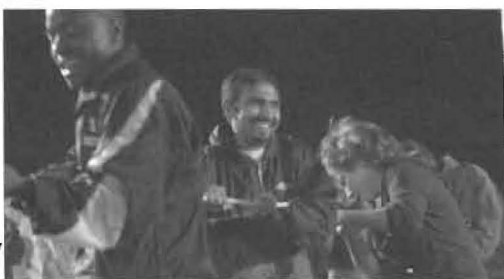

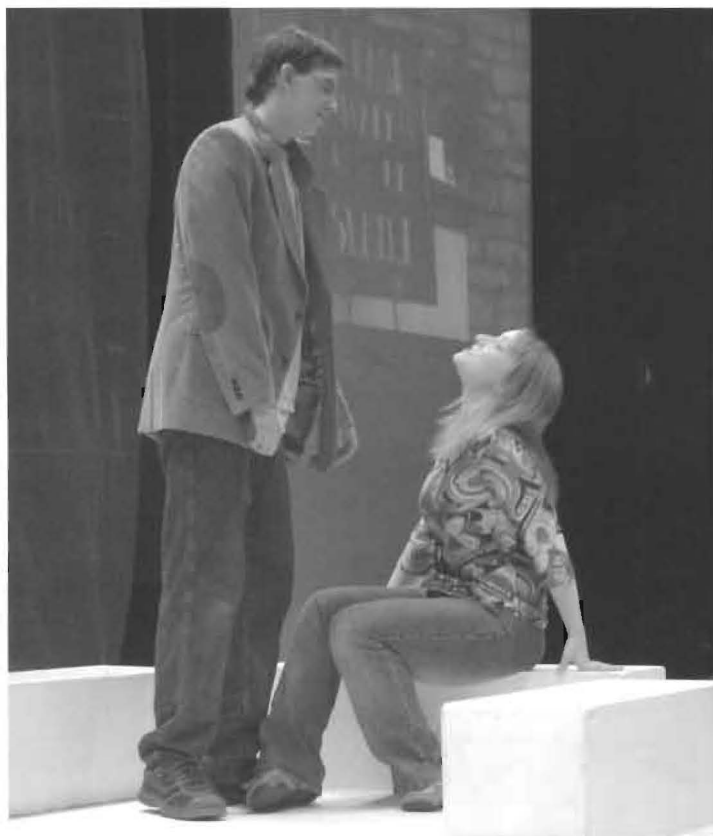
We Are Performers

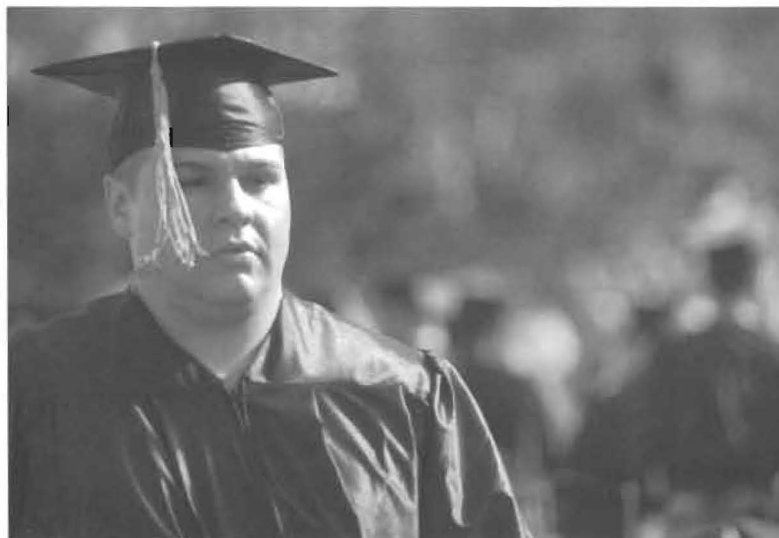

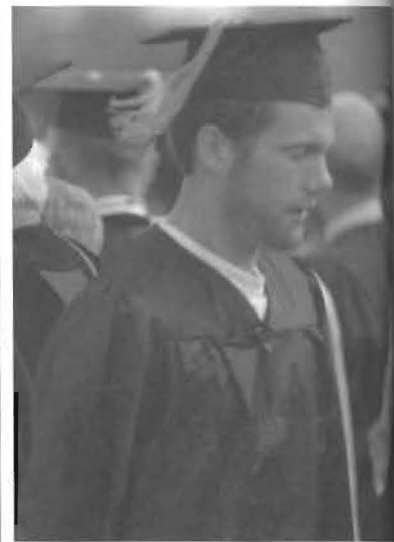

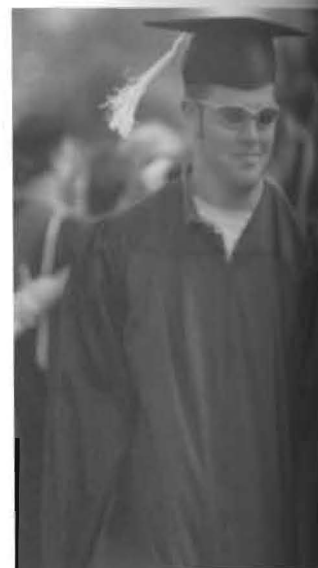

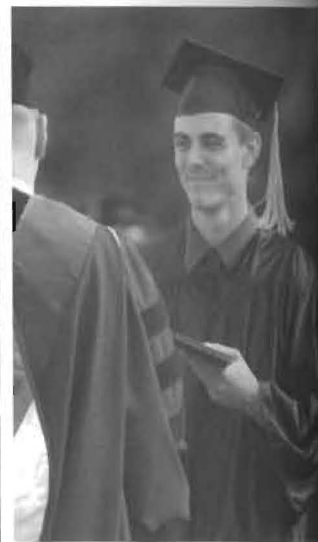

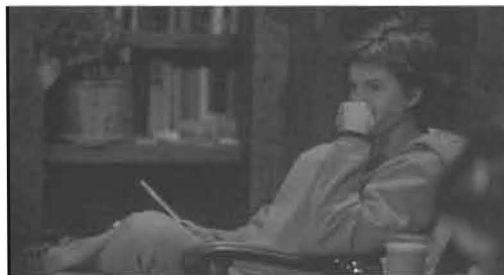

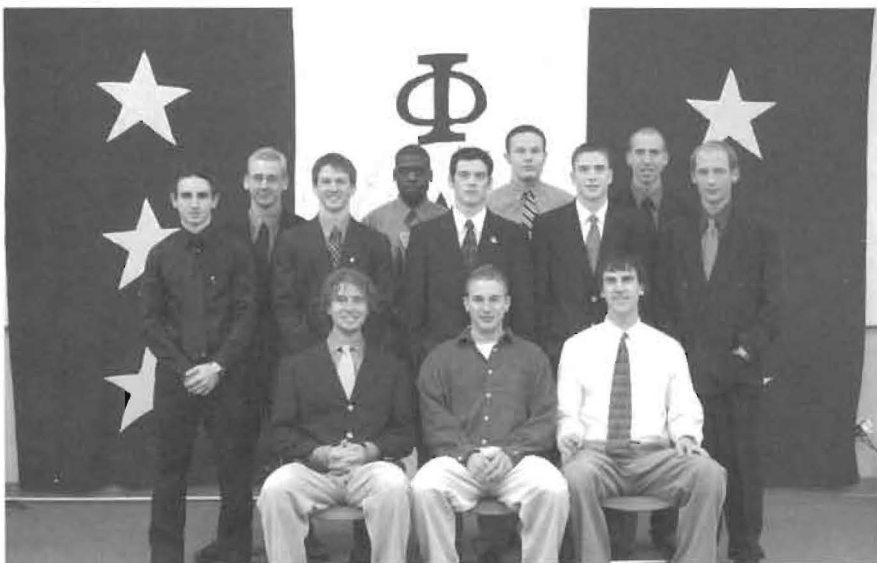

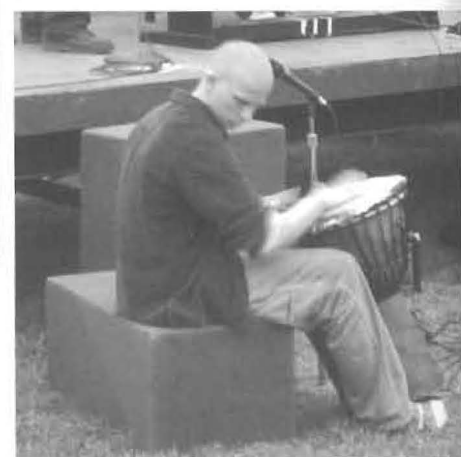

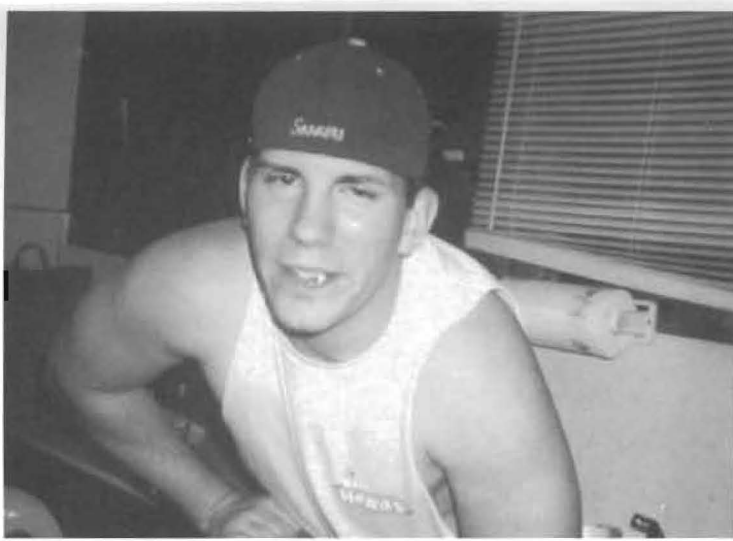

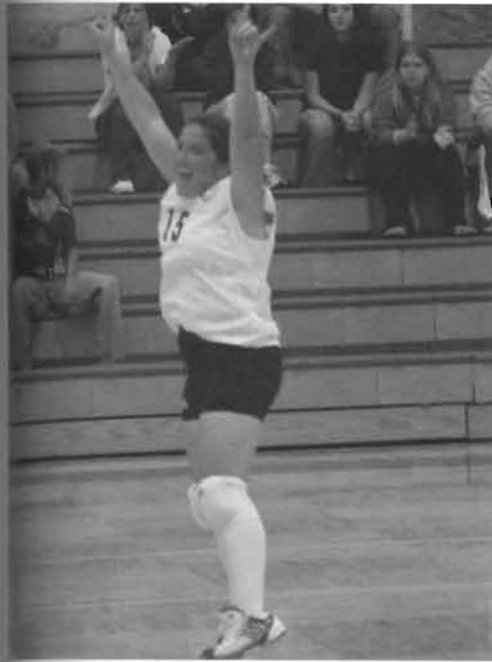

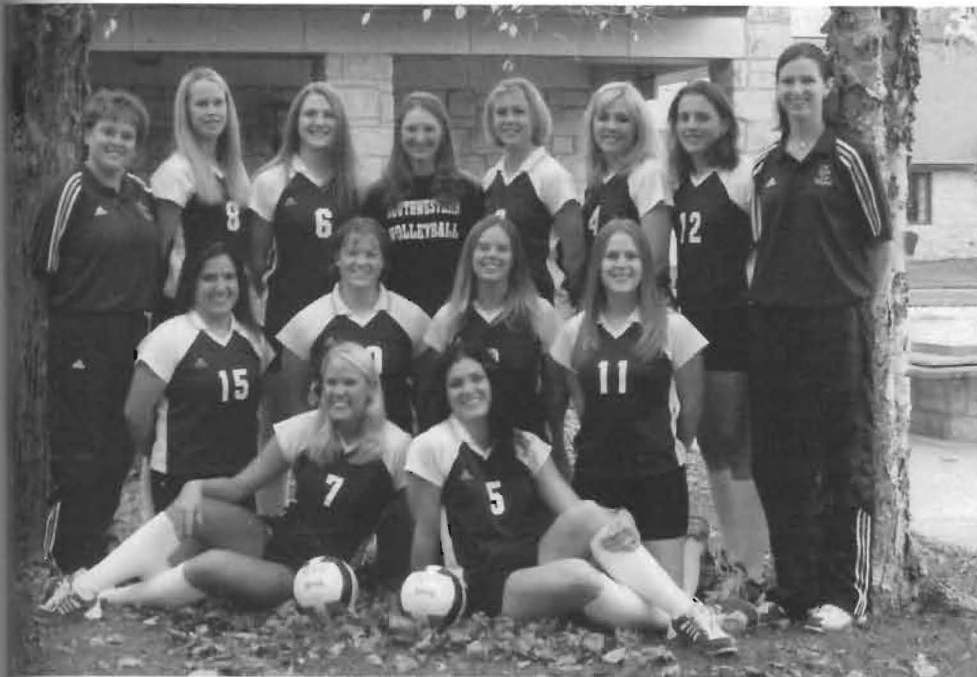

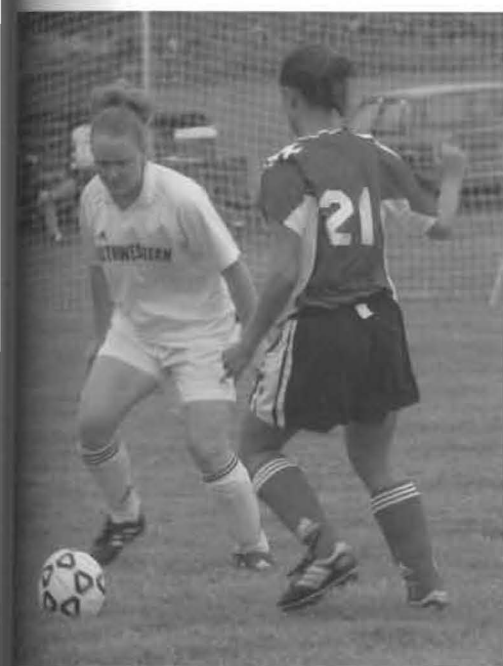

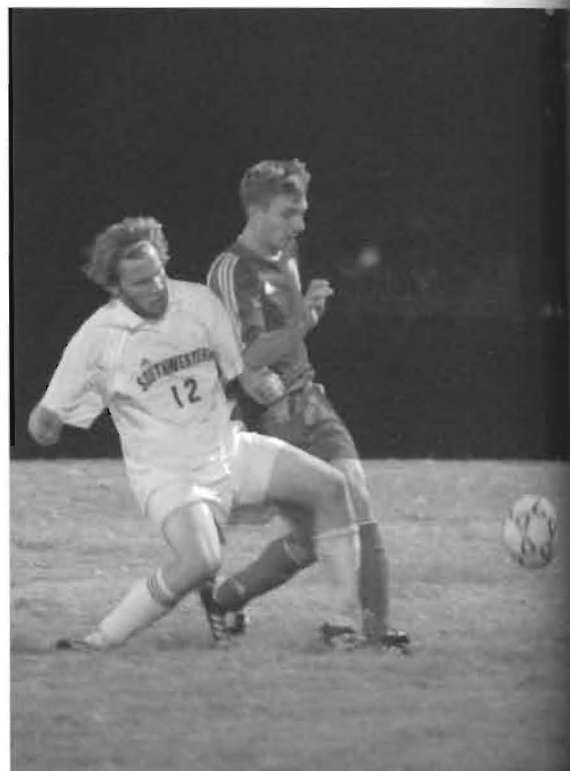

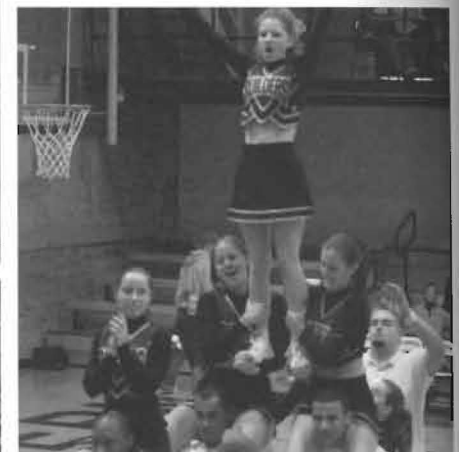

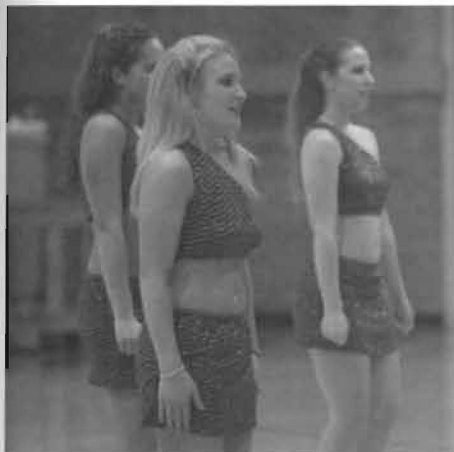

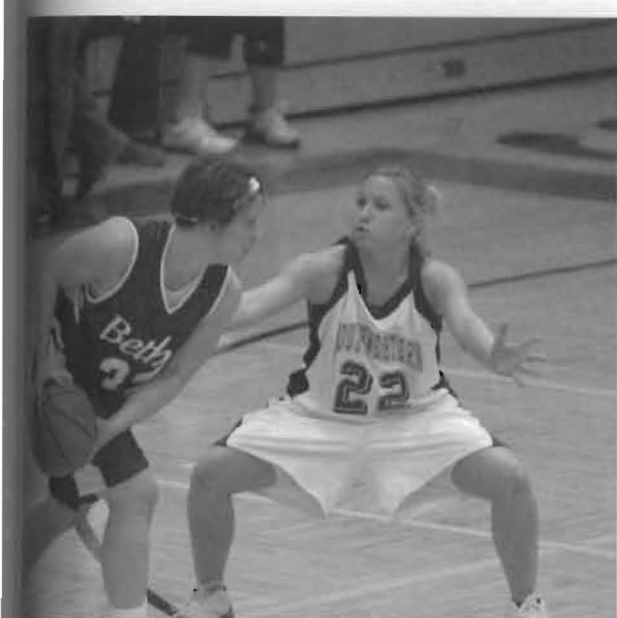

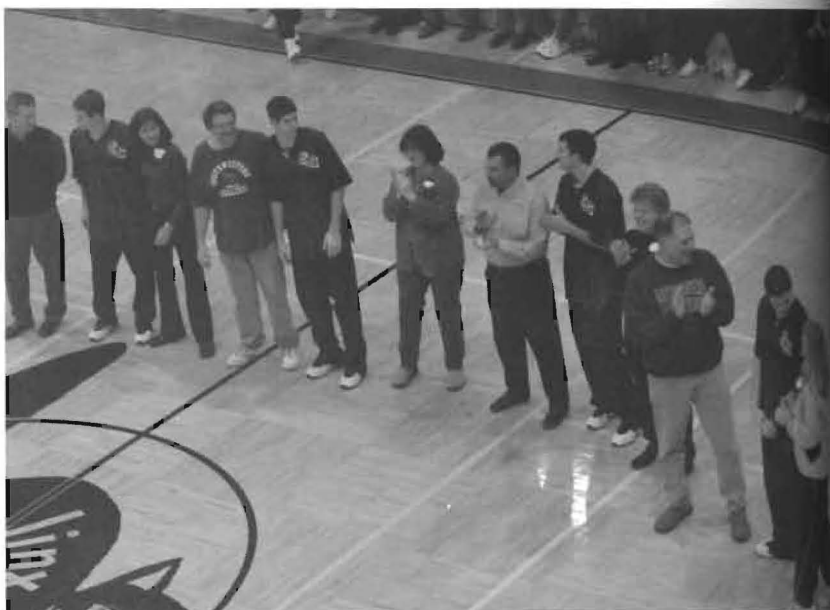

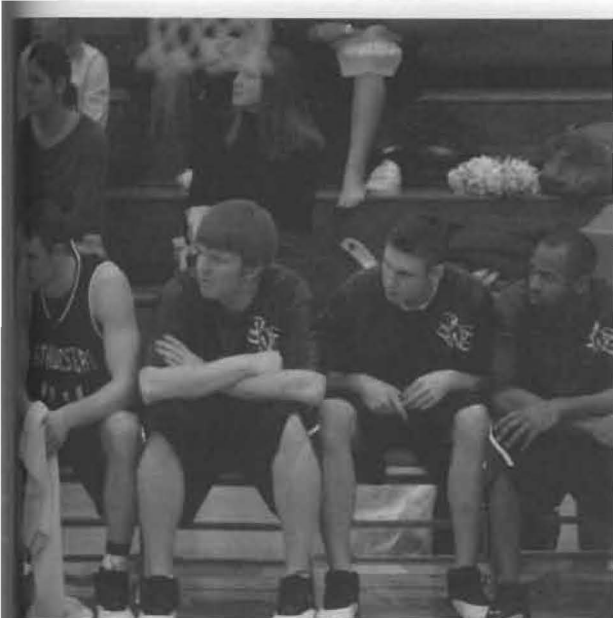

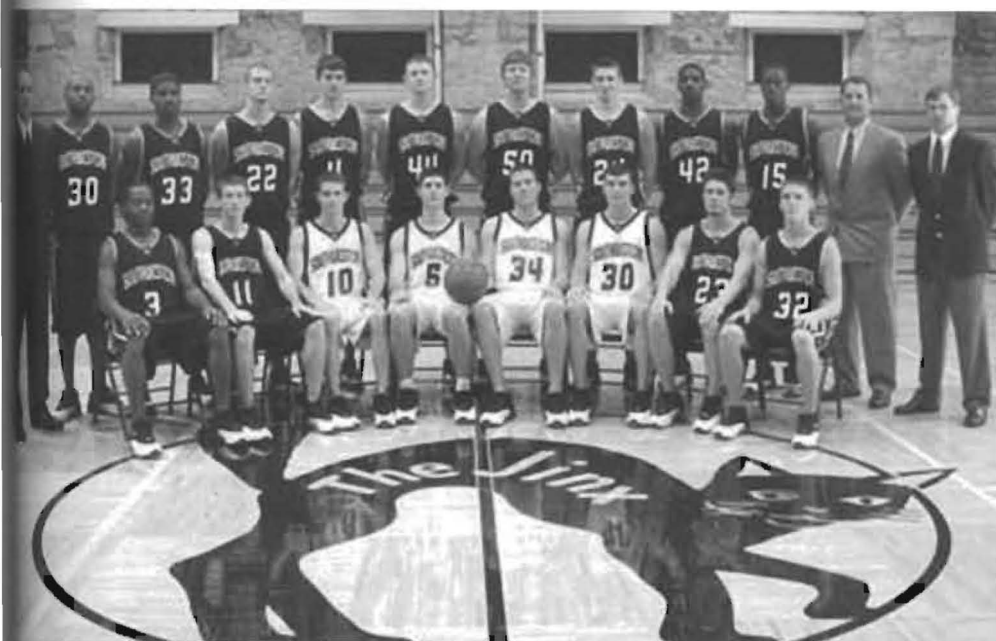

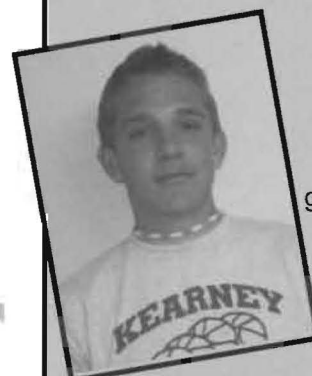

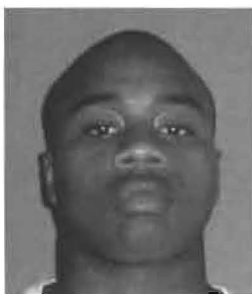
