## SC Goes Green With Service Learning Program

Southwestern College's hallmark service learning emphasis has grown to four programs with the institution of the new Green Team, which will officially launch in the fall of 2008. Students are now being recruited to the program that will promote sustainability education as well as student leadership development. The team joins award-winning service learning options Leadership Southwestern, Discipleship Southwestern, and Students in Free Enterprise (SIFE).

A four-year co-curricular activity, the Green Team is part of the college's commitment to "go green" that began when SC joined the American College and University Presidents' Climate Commitment.

Members of the Green Team will receive scholarship support of

> participate in activities such as recycling, conserving resources on campus and in the community, and pioneering college use of renewable energy sources. "Southwestern has put membership on the Green Team on an equal footing with participation in an athletic team or music ensemble," said President Dick Merriman.

"Many college-bound students are very concerned about environmental issues, and we want to give them handson experience with addressing these concerns."

Jason Speegle, valedictorian and 1999 graduate of the Leadership Southwestern program, has been hired to coach the Green Team. He has been involved in teaching and mission work in the Dominican Republic since 2003.

Southwestern is one of only two Kansas four-year colleges who are charter members of the American College and University President's Climate Commitment. In doing so Southwestern pledged to take active steps to reduce its carbon emissions, undertake programs to recycle and reduce waste, and increase its use of sustainable energy sources like wind and solar power.

Southwestern has already begun retrofitting fluorescent light fixtures across the campus to reduce power usage and has completed replacement of windows in the college library with energy-efficient double-paned windows. Several other projects to reduce use of energy and to make fuller use of renewable sources of energy are being studied, including electric powered vehicles for plant/custodial employees on campus and a solar or wind power station. Students will also pursue offcampus projects through partnerships and collaborations

The college's commitment not only underscores the value of being good

stewards of natural resources. but also is an important educational addition and one that will save the college money in the long run, according to Merriman.

"All over the globe people are understanding in new ways the importance of sustainable practices," he said. "We want to prepare our graduates to be leaders in a world that values sustainability."

The program's basic structure is that of a co-curricular service learning team in which students may major in any academic program. Members will be required to take Environmental Issues and leadership classes. Projects will become more advanced from freshmen to senior year, and students may apply for the activity grants each year.

"We look forward to becoming one of the first colleges in the Midwest to make such a commitment to green issues and providing leadership on this important issue," Merriman said.

The Center for Belarusian Studies at Southwestern College will host its inaugural lecture Saturday, April 19, when Stanislau Shushkevich speaks at 2 p.m. in Wichita's Hyatt Regency Hotel.

The first head of state of independent Belarus from 1991 to 1994, Shushkevic declared the dissolution of the Soviet Union with Boris Yeltsin and Leonid Kravchuk. With doctoral degrees in physics and mathematics, he also is an author and originator of award-winning textbooks, as well as more than 150 articles and 50 inventions.

## **Woodrow Wilson Visiting Fellow Examines Health Ethics Issues**

James Lindemann Nelson. professor of bioethics at Michigan

University, was on campus and in Wichita Feb. 25-29 under a program sponsored by a national fellowship foundation.

His visit was underwritten by the Woodrow Wilson National Fellowship Foundation, a group that engages leaders from a range of professions to spend weeklong residencies at small liberal arts colleges, helping connect their work to the world. Now more than 35 years old, the program recently came under the administration of the Council of Independent Colleges.

Nelson teaches bioethics and moral theory in the philosophy department of Michigan State University. Prior to joining Michigan State's faculty, he taught at the University of Tennessee at Knoxville.

While at Southwestern, Nelson gave a public lecture on end-oflife issues; led class discussions that examined organ transplant issues; met with medical staff of William Newton Hospital and with Cumbernauld Village staff to talk about end-oflife issues; and facilitated sessions concerning dementia at Kansas Health Ethics, Inc., in Wichita, and at Cumbernauld Village in Winfield.
